HEAVEN CALLS—IS YOUR RINGER ON?

Blessing and prayers to all our friends, supporters and newsletter subscribers of the Central NY Marian Center.

Our hearts should ring out in celebration and great joy as we celebrate the 4th of July, Independence Day. Do we really treasure our freedom from slavery and tyranny from foreign monarchs???

The Fourth of July is the most patriotic of U.S. holidays. As the 'Red, White and Blue' waves from sea to shining sea, parades, fireworks and social celebrations fill the day. It's a special time to cherish the dignity of all human life that the Creator intended for us.

We celebrate with great joy and thanksgiving, the day that set us apart from the whole world. July 4th, 1776 was a very solemn day for the 55 men who affixed their signatures to the Declaration of Independence.

Men of high ideals formed the words of the Constitution and a Bill of Rights that were inspired by the **Father in Heaven** to create a land of higher ideals and principles. Intended so that this country could become an example to the rest of the world by creating a Republic for all that chose to come to this great new world.

Patriots gave up their fortunes and very lives to give us this free Nation under **God**, with certain unalienable rights. Free at last to practice out faith and live our lives adhering to the guiding principles that the **Father in Heaven** intended for this great land we call America.

Two thousand years ago, a man called Jesus came into the world, sent by our Heavenly Father to set us free from the bondage and tyranny of sin under the influence of the monarchy of the evil one. Like the patriots of the American Revolution, He gave up His life, His own precious Body and Blood to gain our freedom from the influence of Satan and the penalty of sin. He opened up the gates to "Eternal Salvation" and gave us the constitution of His holy gospels to live by.

So, as we remember our Founding Fathers of this great nation, let us never forget our **Heavenly Father** and all He has given and blessed us with.

Our **Blessed Mother** over the centuries calls us to give continuous thanksgiving to our **Heavenly Father** for all He has given us. **Our Lady** also tells us we must be willing to pay a price for our faith and the salvation of souls as She calls us to daily prayer, sacrifice and penance, keeping us **"One Nation under God"**.

Do our own hearts ring out with great joy as we celebrate the Eucharist at each holy mass? For at every mass we pray, it is truly our very own Independence Day!!!

As our **Blessed Mother** holds the title of **Our Lady of America**, we are reminded of her great feast day in her apparition to **St. Simon Stock** as **Our Lady of Mount Carmel**. Which we celebrate on July 16th.

The feast was assigned to 16 July, because on that date in 1251, according to Carmelite traditions, the scapular was given by the Blessed Virgin to St. Simon Stock; it was first approved by Sixtus V in 1587. After Cardinal Bellarmine had ex-



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amined the Carmelite traditions in 1609, it was declared the patronal feast of the order. The Order of Carmelites takes its name from Mount Carmel in Israel, which was the first place dedicated to the Blessed Virgin and where a chapel was erected in her honor before her Assumption into heaven. Saint Simon Stock entered the Carmelite Order when he was 40 years old. He was sent to Mt. Carmel in the Holy Land where he led a life of prayer and penance.

St. Simon Stock had great devotion to Our Blessed Mother. This may help to explain why the Carmelite Order began to prosper under his guidance despite considerable opposition. In response to his appeal to Our Blessed Mother for help for his oppressed Order, on July 16, 1251 A.D. (he was 86 years old at the time), Mary appeared to him holding a Brown Scapular in her hand. Mary said to him:



"Receive, My beloved son, this habit of thy order: this shall be to thee and to all Carmelites a privilege, that whosoever dies clothed in this shall never suffer eternal fire." This was truly a great gift and a great promise from the Mother of God.

After this apparition, Friar Stock went on to establish Carmelite communities near university towns in England, France and Italy. He became the Superior-General of his order several years after the apparition. Until very recently, the brown scapular was one of the most widely used religious symbols of personal dedication to the mission of **Mary** found in her last recorded words in the **Bible (John 2:5)**.

For over 700 years, the Brown Scapular of **Our Lady of Mount Carmel** has been one of the most precious gifts and highly-indulgenced Sacramentals of our Church. It is more than that, however; it is in reality a garment, given to us by Our **Blessed Mother** which makes us her special children. Blessing and clothing with the Scapular of the **'Blessed Virgin of Mt.**

Carmel' enrolls the individual in the Scapular Confraternity and admits him to a share in all the spiritual works performed by the Religious of Mount Carmel.

History of the Cross

This was a shift in practice where the central focus of a church building could be any image, even of Mary, an event or patronal saints. The old Los Angeles Cathedral of St. Vibiana, for example, had as its central focus point a class casket containing the remains of Vibiana herself. The apse altar of St. Peters Basilica has not a cross in sight; the focus is on a representation of a chair.

Because the custom of placing a large crucifix as the focal point of a parish church was so widespread, many people began to assume it was a requirement, thus leading to many bitter fights in designing new churches or renovating older churches. A similar point of contention is with processional crosses, with the widespread (but by no means universal) custom of including a corpus becoming virtually required (an angry attack team will form among certain parishioners if the processional cross does not have a corpus).

For many the use of a crucifix over a plain cross is considered a point of Roman Catholic identity, despite the fact that the cross has been venerated in many forms throughout our history. The fact remains that crucifix is *not* a specifically Roman usage; Orthodox, Anglicans and Lutherans all use the crucifix in various settings, and many Catholics prefer a plain cross. One might note, for example, that the pastoral staff of **Pope John Paul II** had a corpus while the pastoral staff of **Pope Benedict XVI** does not.
