HEAVEN CALLS—IS YOUR RINGER ON?

Blessing and prayers to all our friends, supporters and newsletter subscribers of the Central NY Marian Center.

Are the ringers in our hearts ringing out in every fiber within our bodies as we celebrate the greatest Feast of Holy Mother Church and the way to Eternal Salvation? This is truly a month of Salvation and Mercy, it can't get any better than that!!!

This month we complete the season of Lent and begin the Easter season with Easter Sunday and continue with Divine Mercy Sunday.

Easter Sunday April 5, 2015

The Church commences the celebration of the great feast of Easter with "The Sacred Paschal Triduum" also called the Easter Triduum. The three days (triduum) commences with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday night, continues with Good Friday service and culminates with the Easter Vigil on Saturday night. The Easter Vigil begins then the season of Easter Time.

The name Easter comes from Eastre, an ancient Anglo-Saxon goddess, originally of

the dawn. In pagan times an annual spring festival was held in her honor. Some Easter customs have come from this and other pre-Christian spring festivals. Others come from the Passover feast of the Jews, observed in memory of their deliverance from Egypt. The resurrection of **Jesus** took place during the Passover. In the early days of Christianity Easter and the Passover were closely associated.

Prior to A.D. 325, Easter was celebrated on different days of the week, including Friday, Saturday and Sunday. In that year, the Council of Nicaea was convened by emperor Constantine. They issued the Easter Rule which places Easter on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the vernal equinox (first day of Spring). Therefore, Easter must be celebrated on a Sunday between the dates of March 22 and April 25.

Many Easter symbols and customs come from the Old World.

The Cross

The Cross is the symbol of the crucifixion, as opposed to the Resurrection. However, at the Council of Nicaea, In A.D. 325, Con-

stantine decreed that the Cross was the official symbol of Christianity. The Cross is not only a symbol of Easter, but it is more widely used, especially by the Catholic Church, as a year-round symbol of their faith.

Easter Lilv

The with lily symbolizes the Resurrection. Yet, lilies have long been revered by pagans of various lands as a holy symbol associated with reproduction. It was considered a phallic symbol!

The Easter Bunny

The Easter Bunny also originated with the pagan festival of Eastre. The goddess, Eastre, was worshipped by the Anglo-Saxons through her earthly symbol, the rabbit. The Germans brought the symbol of the Easter rabbit to America. It was widely ignored by other Christians until shortly after the Civil War. Easter itself was not widely celebrated in America until after that time.

The Easter Egg

The exchange of eggs in the springtime is a custom that was centuries old when Easter was first celebrated by Christians. The egg was symbol of rebirth in most cultures. Eggs were often wrapped in gold leaf or, if



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you were a peasant, colored brightly by boiling them in with the leaves or petals of certain flowers.

Today, children hunt colored eggs and place them in Easter baskets along with the modern version of real Easter eggs—plastic eggs filled with chocolate candy.

The season of Easter Time, covers the fiftyday period from Easter to Pentecost. It can be seen as:

The death and resurrection of Jesus is the central belief of our Christian faith. The heart of the Easter message is that Jesus is risen! And is with us now. In the first Memorial Acclamation in the Eucharistic prayer we proclaim, "Christ has died, Christ is Risen, Christ will come again." Eastern Catholics at this time greet each other with the words, "Christ is Risen; He is truly Risen!"

Easter is the greatest celebration of **God's** unconditional and undying love of each of us; a love so strong that death cannot destroy it.

Remember your Easter duty?
Most Catholics today receive Holy Communion each time they go to Mass, but that wasn't always the case. In fact, for a variety of reasons, many Catholics in the past very rarely received the Eucharist. Therefore, the Catholic Church made it a requirement for all Catholics to receive Communion at least once per year, during the Easter season. The Church also urges that faithful to receive the Sacrament of Confession in preparation for that Easter Communion, though you're only required to go to Confession fi you have committed a mortal sin.

Feast of Divine Mercy Sunday April 12, 2015

Divine Mercy Sunday is celebrated in the Sunday after Easter, the Octave of Easter. The Feast and Devotion of Divine Mercy is kept in a diary of **St. Faustina Kowalska**. A Polish nun reported visions and visitations from **Jesus** and conversations with Him. He asked her to paint the vision of His Merciful Divinity being poured from his sacred heart and specifically asked for a feast of Divine Mercy to be established on the first Sunday after Easter so mankind would take refuge in Him. "This Feast emerged from the very depths of My mercy, and it is

confirmed in the vast depths of My tender mercies. Every soul believing and trusting in My mercy will obtain it." (Jesus' words Diary 420) "I want to grant a complete pardon to the souls that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on the Feast of My Mercy."

Divine Mercy Sunday is also the day after the culmination of the novena of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. St. Faustina wrote as Jesus instructed her that the Feast of Mercy (the Sunday after Easter) be preceded by a Divine Mercy Novena which would begin on Good Friday.

Did you know that the in the 1930's **Our Lord Jesus**, Himself requested through St. Faustina that a very special Feast of Divine Mercy be established in His Church and solemnly celebrated on the First Sunday after Easter every year?

Among all the of the elements of devotion to The Divine Mercy requested by **Our Lord** through St. Faustina, the Feast of Mercy holds first place. The Lord's will with regard to its establishment was already made known in His first revelation to the saint. In all, there were 14 revelations concerning the desired feast. He joins the feast to the designated Sunday in eight revelations: Diary, 49, 88, 280, 299, 341, 570, 699, and 742. He also implies a connection between the feast and that Sunday on some other occasions recorded in the saint's Diary (see Diary, 420, 89).

The "First Sunday after Easter" - which is designated in "The Liturgy of the Hours and the Celebration of the Eucharist" as the "Octave Day of Easter" - was officially called the Second Sunday of Easter after the liturgical reform of Vatican II. Now, by the Decree of the Congregation for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacraments, the name of this liturgical day has been changed to: "Second Sunday of Easter, or of Divine Mercy."

The feast of Divine Mercy, as recorded in the diary of Saint Faustina, receives from **Jesus** Himself the biggest promises of Grace related to the Devotion of Divine Mercy. In specific, **Jesus** states that the soul that goes to Sacramental Confession (the confession may take place some days before), and receives Holy Eucharistic Communion on that day, shall obtain the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment. That means each

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person would go immediately after death to the heaven, without suffering in purgatory (or hell). Additionally, the Roman Catholic Church grants a **plenary indulgence** (observing the usual rules) with the recitation of some simple prayers.

The devotion was actively promoted by **St. Pope John Paul II** who, on April 30, 2000, canonized **St. Faustina Kowalska**, and officially designated the Sunday after Easter as the Sunday of the Divine Mercy in the General Roman Calendar.

In 1931 Our Lord appeared to her in a vision clothed in a white garment. His right hand raised in a blessing while the left was touching His garment at the breast, where two large rays came forth, one red, the other pale. Jesus said to her: Paint an image according to the pattern you see with the inscription: Jesus, I trust in You.. I promise that the soul that venerates this image will not perish. I also promise victory over (its) enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death. I myself will defend it as My own glory... I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy. That vessel is this image with the inscription: Jesus, I trust in You..I desire that this image be venerated first in your chapel and (then) throughout the world.

St. John Paul II was the greatest advocate for Divine Mercy Sunday. He passed away at 11pm after celebrating the vigil mass for the feast of Divine Mercy, which he instituted.


