HEAVEN CALLS—IS YOUR RINGER ON?

Do our hearts ring out with the great love and joy, as we open ourselves to receive great graces at the invocation of The Seven Sorrows of Mary?

The Catholic Church traditionally dedicated the month of September to Our Lady of Sorrows. The Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows falls right in the middle of the month, on September 15. Because the day before, September 14, is the Feast of the Triumph of the Cross.

This devotion originated in the 12th century. Thanks to the influence of Saint Anselm and Saint Bernard, it spread from monastic circles to the universal Church.

The Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows is tied to an event in the life of her Son. On September 14, we celebrate the instrument of Christ's victory over death; and the next day, we remember the suffering of Mary as she stood at the foot of the Cross and witnessed the torture and death of her Son.

Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary September 8, 2017

The Feast of the Nativity of Our Most Holy Lady, the **Theotokos** and Ever-Virgin Mary is celebrated on September 8 each year. The Feast commemorates the birth of the Mother of Jesus Christ, our Lord.

The birth of early life of the Virgin Mary is not recorded in the Gospels or other books of the New Testament, however this information can be found in a work dating from the second century known as the Book of James or Protoevangelium.

On September 8th in a small town of Bethlehem in Israel in the year 14 BC a woman named Anne gave birth to a girl named Mary. This birth is unique because it was the first ever in history of a human being free from original sin. For Adam and Eve were formed by God directly and were not the product of conception and so nor were they born and their children and all of their descendants were tainted with their original sin. So who was this born, and yes even conceived without from the late second century. this stain? She was the one who would redeem womankind. She was the one who "by Her obedience loosed the knot of Eve's disobedience... who through faith loosed what the virgin Eve had bound in unbelief." (Saint Irenaeus, Against the Heresies, Book II) The Churches of Constantinople in the East and Rome in the West celebrate liturgies in honor of Mary's birth from the sixth and seventh centuries on.

By the seventh century the liturgy was also celebrated in Rome where it had been introduced by monks from the East. By the thirteenth century the liturgy had developed to a solemnity with a major octave (eight days of commemoration prior to the liturgy) and a solemn vigil which was prescribed a feast day. Pope Sergius I (687-701) established a procession (a litania) from the Roman Forum to St. Mary Major for the feast.

During the reform of **St. Pius X**, the octave was simplified, and in 1955 Pius XII abolished it. The liturgy received the rank of feast. The date, September 8, was chosen as the eighth day (an octave) after the former Byzantine New Year.

Sacred Scripture does not record Mary's birth. The earliest known writing regarding Mary's birth is found in the Protoevangelium of James (5:2), which is an apocryphal writing

The Exaltation of the Cross September 14, 2017

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, celebrated every year on September 14, recalls three historical events: the finding of the True Cross by Saint Helena, the mother of the emperor Constantine; the ded-



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ication of churches built by **Constantine** on the site of the **Holy Sepulcher and Mount Calvary**. The restoration of the True Cross to **Jerusalem** by the emperor **Heraclius II**. But in a deeper sense, the feast also celebrates the **Holy Cross** as the instrument of our salvation. This instrument of torture, designed to degrade the worst of criminals, became the life-giving tree that reversed Adam's Original Sin when he ate from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil in the **Garden of Eden**.

The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows September 15, 2017

The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows celebrated on September 15, 2017. Our Lady of Sorrows (Latin: Beata Maria Virgo Perdolens), the Sorrowful Mother or Mother of Sorrows (Latin: Mater Dolorosa), and Our Lady of Piety, Our Lady of the Seven Sorrows or Our Lady of the Seven Dolours are names by which the Blessed Virgin Mary is referred to in relation to sorrows in her life. As Mater Dolorosa, it is also a key subject for Marian art in the Catholic Church.

The purpose of the Devotion of the Seven Sorrows is to promote union with the sufferings of Christ through union with the special suffering that Our Lady endured because she was the Mother of God. By uniting ourselves with both the Passion of Christ and His Holy Mother, we enter into Jesus' Heart and honor Him greatly; He is more honored because we have so honored His Mother.

From the Roman Missal:

The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows falls on September 15. This feast commemorates the sorrowful Mother and the sufferings She experienced in union with Her Son and dates back to the 12th century. Pius XII extended the feast into the Roman Catholic calendar of saints to the Latin Church (18 Sept., 1814), major double. It was assigned to the third Sunday in September. It was raised to the rank of a double of the second class, 13 May, 1908. In 1913, Pope Pius X moved the feast to September 15, the day after the Feast of the Cross. It is still observed on that date.

Our Lady of Sorrows has promised us, "all those who offer up their tears of sorrow to Me, I shall repay them a thousand times over"!!!

Feast of the Archangels September 29, 2017

This feast celebrates the Archangels St. Mi-

chael, St. Gabriel and St. Raphael. Though we cannot know of all the many times these magnificent spirits and powerful allies have entered into history to accomplish God's will, protecting us, driving away demons, and bearing forth messages of God's providential plan of salvation, some of their specific actions are recorded in Sacred Scripture, and, in each case, we obtain a glimpse into their ardent love for God, intently focused wills and formidable intellects.

St. Michael means "Who is like God." As we read in Scripture, it was St. Michael who long ago led the battle against Satan: "Then war broke out in heaven; Michael and his angels battled against the dragon. Although the dragon and his angels fought back, they were overpowered and lost their place in heaven. The huge dragon, the ancient serpent known as the devil or Satan, the seducer of the whole world, was driven out; he was hurled down to earth and his minions with him" (Rev 12:7-9).

St. Michael's will is focused, immovable, and entirely driven toward accomplishing goodness: he is a protector of souls, and wields his unrelenting sword of righteous justice against the poisonous and vindictive aspirations of the one who is known as a liar from the beginning. During a visit to the Sanctuary of Saint Michael the Archangel, the Saint John Paul II said, "The battle against the devil . . . is the principal task of Saint Michael the archangel."

St. Gabriel's name; "God is my strength." As we read in the second antiphon of the Office of Readings, the angel Gabriel appeared to Zechariah and said, "Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall name him John" (see Lk 1:13). Thus St. Gabriel announced the coming of John the Baptist, the greatest prophet of the Most High, who would go before the Lord to prepare his way.

It was **St. Gabriel** who was sent from **God** to **Nazareth**, "to a virgin betrothed to a man named **Joseph**, and the virgin's name was **Mary.** And coming to Her, he said, 'Hail, favored one! The **Lord** is with you'" **(Lk 1:27-28)**.

St. Gabriel's message announced a pivotal moment in humankind's history: the Savior was, by the power of the Holy Spirit, to be conceived in the womb of the Virgin Mary. The Archangel who draws his strength from God brought us the message of strength in

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which we draw our hope: **God** Incarnate was soon to enter history for love of man.

St. Raphael means "God is my Health." St. Raphael is one of seven angels "who enter and serve before the Glory of the Lord" (Tob 12:15). The meaning of Raphael's name reflects the fact that he touched Tobit's eyes in order to heal them of blindness. In the third antiphon of the Office of Readings, we are reminded that Raphael stands before God: "I am the angel Raphael, I stand in the presence of the Lord; as for you, bless the Lord, and proclaim his wonderful deeds."

There is a great deal we can learn from the Archangels, who are powerful messengers, allies and friends of men.

The Catechism of the Catholic church reminds us that with their whole being the angels are servants God. Because they "always behold the face of my Father who is in heaven" they are the "mighty ones who do his word, hearkening to the voice of his word" (CCC No. 329; Mt 18:10).


