
The month of December is dedicated to the Immaculate Conception, which is ordinarily celebrated on December 8 but since it falls on a Sunday, the feast has been transferred to December 9. The first 24 days of December fall during the liturgical season known as of Advent and are represented by the liturgical color purple, a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart. The remaining days of December mark the beginning of the Christmas season. The liturgical color changes to white or gold, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence. Christmastide begins with the First Vespers (Evening Prayer) of Christmas on December 24th and ends on the Sunday after Epiphany.

St. Nicholas of Myra December 12, 2019

Saint Nicholas, bishop of Myra, is undoubtedly one of the most popular saints honored in the Western world. In the United States, his memory has survived in the unique personality of Saint Claus, the jolly, rotund, white-bearded gentleman who captivates children with promises of gifts on Christmas Eve.

In spite of his widespread fame, **Saint Nicholas,** from the historian's point of view, is hardly more than a name. He was born in the last years of the third century in Asia Minor. His uncle, the archbishop of Myra in Lycia, ordained him and appointed him abbot of a nearby monastery. At the death of the archbishop, Nicholas was chosen to fill the vacancy, and he served in this position until his death. About the time of the persecutions of Diocletian, he was imprisoned for preaching Christianity but was released during the reign of Emperor Constantine.

Popular legends have involved Saint Nich-



olas in a number of charming stories, one of which relates Nicholas' charity toward the poor. A man of Patara had lost his fortune, and finding himself unable to support his three maiden daughters, was planning to turn them into the streets as prostitutes. Nicholas heard of the man's intentions and secretly threw three bags of gold through a window into the home, thus providing dowries for the daughters.



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The three bags of gold mentioned in this story are said to be the origin of the three gold balls that form the emblem of pawnbrokers.

After Nicholas' death on December 6 in or around 345, his body was buried in the cathedral at Myra. It remained there until 1087, when seamen of Bari, an Italian coastal town, seized the relics of the saint and transferred them to their own city. Veneration for Nicholas had already spread throughout Europe as well as Asia, but this occurrence led to a renewal of devotion in the West. Countless miracles were attributed to the saint's intercession. His relics are still preserved in the church of San Nicola in Bari; an oily substance, known as Manna di S. Nicola, which is highly valued for its medicinal powers, is said to flow from them.

The story of **Saint Nicholas** came to America in distorted fashion. Catholics should think of Nicholas as a saint, a confessor of the faith and the bishop of Myra, not merely as a jolly man from the North Pole who brings happiness to small children. Many countries and locations honor St. Nicholas as patron: Greece, Russia, the Kingdom of Naples, Sicily, Lorraine, and many cities in Italy, Germany, Austria, and Belgium.

The Feast of The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary December 9, 2019



The feast of the **Blessed Virgin's Immacu**late Conception is the most solemn of all those which the Church celebrates during the holy time of Advent; for the Conception of **Mary** tells us that the Birth of **Jesus** is not far off.

The intention of the Church, in this feast, is not only to celebrate the anniversary of the happy moment in which began, in the womb of the pious Anne, the life of the ever-glorious Virgin Mary; but also to honor the sublime privilege, by which Mary was preserved from original sin.

On December 8, 1854, **Pope Pius IX** officially declared the **Immaculate Concep**tion a dogma of the Church, which means that all Christians are bound to accept it as true. As the Holy Father wrote in the Apostolic Constitution **Ineffabilis Deus.**.

Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of Her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854. (ccc 490,491)

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is the patronal feast of the United States. Pope Leo XIII, Nov. 30 1879, raised the feast to a double of the first class.

The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe December 12, 2019

Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared in Mexico as the pregnant Mother of **God** to **Saint Juan Diego**, an Aztec Indian, on December 9, 10, and 12, 1531. She left a Miraculous Image of her appearance on his cactus fiber cloak (tilma), which still exists today for all to see in the **Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City.**

On December 9, 1531, in Mexico, Our Lady appeared to **St. Juan Diego**, a poor humble Aztec Indian who had recently converted to the Catholic faith. She identified herself as the ever Virgin Holy Mary, Mother of the True God for whom we live, of the Creator of all things, Lord of heaven and the earth. She asked him to go to the Bishop and tell him to build a church where she said "I will show and

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offer all of my love, my compassion, my help and my protection to my people." **St. Juan Diego** did as she asked, but the Bishop asked for a sign that this message was really from Our Lady.

After complying to the Bishop's request for a sign, She also left for us an image of herself imprinted miraculously on the native's *tilma*, a poor quality cactus-cloth, which should have deteriorated in 20 years but shows no sign of decay 480 years later and still defies all scientific explanations of its origin.

There is reason to believe that at Tepeyac Mary came in her glorified body, and her actual physical hands rearranged the roses in **St. Juan Diego's tilma**, which makes this apparition very special. **St. Juan Diego's** feast day is December 9, 2017.

Our Lady came to offer faith, hope and consolation to the oppressed natives of **Mexico** and to reconcile them with their Spanish rulers. She put an end to the bloody human sacrifice of the Aztecs and converted eight million natives in the next seven years!!!

Christmas December 25, 2019

A Holy day has dawned upon us. Come, you nations, and adore the Lord. For today a great light has come upon the earth.



For a child is born to us, a son is given to us; upon his shoulder dominion rests. They name Him **Wonder-Counselor, God-Hero, Father-Forever, Prince of Peace.** (Isaiah 9:1-6)

"For the first coming of **Our Lord** in the flesh [**December 25, the fourth day**] in the reign of Augustus [**the forty-second year**, and] in the year 5500 [from Adam]. And He suffered in His thirty-third year [March 25, the parasceve, in the eighteenth year of **Tiberius Caesar**, during the consulate of **Rufus and Rubellio**]."

The early Christians, who attributed to Christ not only the title ("Kyrios") but also many other honors that the pagans paid to their "divine" emperors, naturally felt inclined to honor the birth of the Savior. In most places the commemoration of Christ's birth was included in the Feast of the Epiphany (Manifestation) on January 6, one of the oldest annual feasts. Soon after the end of the last great persecution, about the year 330, the Church in Rome assigned December 25 for the celebration of the birth of Christ.



Christmas soon became a feast of such great importance that from the fifth century on it marked the beginning of the ecclesiastical year. After the tenth century, the season of Advent came to form an integral part of the Christmas cycle; thus the beginning of the ecclesiastical year was advanced to the first Sunday of Advent.

The English word "Christmas" is based on the same pattern as the old names for other feast days in the liturgical year, such as Michaelmas, Martinmas, Candlemas. The first mention of the name, *Christes Maesse,*" dates from the year 1038. It means "the Mass of Christ." As **Christ** came into the world as the "Light of the World." Let the light of the "Prince of Peace, the Lord of Lords and the King of Kings" remain with us always and open our eyes that we may see Him in all things and in all human beings throughout the world. Let Him open our ears that we may hear His "word" and let Him open our hearts that we may receive Him, live with Him, in Him, and share in His glory for all Eternity!!

Feast of the Holy Family December 29, 2019

Scripture tells us practically nothing about the first years and the boyhood of the Child Jesus. All we know are the facts of the sojourn in Egypt, the return to Nazareth, and the incidents that occurred when the twelve-year-old boy accompanied his parents to Jerusalem. The general breakdown of the family, however, at the end of the past century and at the beginning of our own, prompted the popes, especially the far-sighted Leo XIII, to promote the observance of this feast with the hope that it might instill into Christian families something of the faithful love and the devoted attachment that characterize the family of Nazareth. The primary purpose of the Church in instituting and promoting this feast is to present the Holy Family as the model and exemplar of all Christian families.

Looking at the Holy Family, we see the love, the protection, and the diligent care that they gave to the Redeemer. We can not fail to feel uneasiness, perhaps a shameful thought, for the times in which we have not rendered the appropriate care and attention to the Blessed Eucharist. We can only ask for forgiveness and do penance for all the sacrilegious acts

and the lack of respect that are committed in front of the Blessed Eucharist. We can only ask the Lord, through the intersession of the Holy Family of Nazareth, for a greater love for their Son Incarnate, who has



decided to remain here on earth with us every day until the end of time.

The gifts of the Magi, I do not have. I come forth on bended knee before the Prince of Peace, truly present in every Tabernacle in the world!!!
