HEAVEN CALLS—IS YOUR RINGER ON?

The month of December is dedicated to the Immaculate Conception. The first 24 days of December fall during the liturgical season known as of Advent and are represented by the liturgical color purple, a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart. The remaining days of December mark the beginning of the Christmas season. The liturgical color changes to white or gold, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence.

The Feast of The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary December 8, 2020

The feast of the Blessed Virgin's Immaculate Conception is the most solemn of all those which the Church celebrates during the holy time of Advent; for the Conception of Mary tells us that the Birth of Jesus is not far off.

The intention of the Church, in this feast, is not only to celebrate the anniversary of the happy moment in which began, in the womb of the pious Anne, the life of

the ever-glorious **Virgin Mary**; but also to honor the sublime privilege, by which **Mary** was preserved from original sin.

On December 8, 1854, **Pope Pius IX** officially declared the **Immaculate Conception a dogma of the Church**, which means that all Christians are bound to accept it as true. As the Holy Father wrote



in the Apostolic Constitution <u>Ineffabilis</u> <u>Deus</u>.

Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of Her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854. (ccc 490,491)

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is the patronal feast of the United States. Pope Leo XIII, Nov. 30 1879, raised the feast to a double of the first class.

The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe December 12, 2020

Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared in Mexico as the pregnant Mother of **God** to **Saint Juan Diego**, an Aztec Indian, on December 9, 10, and 12, 1531. She left a Miraculous Image of her appearance on his cactus fiber cloak (tilma), which still exists today for all to see in the **Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City.**

On December 9, 1531, in Mexico, Our Lady appeared to **St. Juan Diego**, a poor



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humble Aztec Indian who had recently converted to the Catholic faith. She identified herself as the ever Virgin Holy Mary, Mother of the True God for whom we live, of the Creator of all things, Lord of heaven and the earth. She asked him to go to the Bishop and tell him to build a church where she said "I will show and offer all of my love, my compassion, my help and my protection to my people." St. Juan Diego did as she asked, but the Bishop asked for a sign that this message was really from Our Lady.

After complying to the Bishop's request for a sign, She also left for us an image of herself imprinted miraculously on the native's *tilma*, a poor quality cactus-cloth, which should have deteriorated in 20 years but shows no sign of decay 480 years later and still defies all scientific explanations of its origin.

There is reason to believe that at Tepeyac Mary came in her glorified body, and her actual physical hands rearranged the roses in St. Juan Diego's tilma, which makes this apparition very special. St. Juan Diego's feast day is December 9, 2017.

Our Lady came to offer faith, hope and consolation to the oppressed natives of Mexico and to reconcile them with their Spanish rulers. She put an end to the bloody human sacrifice of the Aztecs and converted eight million natives in the next seven years!!!

Christmas December 25, 2020

Today the Church celebrates the Birth of Jesus Christ, the first day in the octave of Christmas. Throughout Advent the Church longed ardently for the coming of our Savior. Today she celebrates His birth with unrestrained joy. "The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us." The Son of God became man to give us a share in that divine life which is eternally His in the Blessed Trinity. Christmas time begins on December 24 with the first Vespers of the feast and ends on the feast of the Baptism of Christ. White vestments reappear in our churches as a sign of joy.

A Holy day has dawned upon us. Come, you nations, and adore the Lord. For today a great light has come upon the earth.

For a child is born to us, a son is given to us; upon his shoulder dominion rests. They name Him Wonder-Counselor, God-Hero, Father-Forever, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9:1-6)

"For the first coming of **Our Lord** in the flesh [**December 25**, the fourth day] in the reign of Augustus [the forty-second year, and] in the year 5500 [from Adam]. And He suffered in His thirty-third year [March 25, the parasceve, in the eighteenth year of **Tiberius Caesar**, during the consulate of Rufus and Rubellio]."

In most places the commemoration of **Christ's birth** was included in the **Feast of the Epiphany** (Manifestation) on January 6, one of the oldest annual feasts. Soon after the end of the last great persecution, about the year 330, the Church in Rome assigned December 25 for the celebration of the birth of **Christ**.



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Christmas soon became a feast of such great importance that from the fifth century on it marked the beginning of the ecclesiastical year. After the tenth century, the season of Advent came to form an integral part of the Christmas cycle; thus the beginning of the ecclesiastical year was advanced to the first Sunday of Advent.

The Christmas feast is a festival full of iov. The Eternal Word has become Man and dwells among us. The longings of the patriarchs and prophets are fulfilled. With the shepherds we hurry to the manger and adore the Incarnate Son of God, who for us and for our salvation descended upon earth. The purpose of the Christmas feast is beautifully expressed in the Preface of the Nativity: "For by the mystery of the Word made flesh the light of Thy glory hath shone anew upon the eyes of our mind; so that while we acknowledge Him a God seen by men, we may be drawn by Him to the love of things unseen."

The English word "Christmas" is based on the same pattern as the old names for other feast days in the liturgical year, such as Michaelmas, Martinmas, Candlemas. The first mention of the name, *Christes Maesse*," dates from the year 1038. It means "the Mass of Christ."

As Christ came into the world as the "Light of the World." Let the light of the "Prince of Peace, the Lord of Lords and the King of Kings" remain with us always and open our eyes that we may see Him in all things and in all human beings throughout the world. Let Him open our ears that we may hear His "word" and let Him open our hearts that we may receive Him, live with Him, in Him, and share in His glory for all Eternity!!

St. Stephen, First Martyr December 26, 2020

The deacon **Stephen**, stoned in Jerusalem two years after the death of Christ, has always been the object of very special veneration by the faithful. He is the first martyr. The account in the **Acts of the Apostles** relating his arrest and the accusations brought against him emphasize the parallel with our Savior's trial; he was stoned outside the city wall and died, like his Master, praying for his executioners.



Stephen was "filled with faith and with the Holy Spirit," "full of grace and strength" he showed himself as a man of God, radiating divine grace and apostolic zeal. As the first witness to Christ he confronted his oppo-

nents with quiet courage and the promise made by Jesus (Mark 13.11) was fulfilled: "...Disputing with Stephen they were not able to resist the wisdom and the spirit that spoke."

In St. Stephen, the first martyr, the liturgy emphasizes the imitator of Christ even to the extent of the complete gift of self, to the extent of that great charity which made him pray in his suffering for his executioners.

Feast of the Holy Family December 27, 2020

Scripture tells us practically nothing about the first years and the boyhood of the Child Jesus. All we know are the facts of the sojourn in Egypt, the return to Nazareth, and the incidents that occurred when the twelve-year-old boy accompanied his parents to Jerusalem. The general breakdown of the family, however, at the end of the past century and at the beginning of our own, prompted the popes, especially the far-sighted Leo XIII, to promote the observance of this feast with the hope that it might instill into Christian families something of the faithful love and the devoted attachment that

feast is to present the Holy
Family as the
model and
exemplar of all
Christian families.

Looking at the Holy Family, we see the love, the protection, and the diligent care that they gave to the Redeemer. We can not fail to feel uneasiness, perhaps a shameful thought, for the times in which we have not rendered the appropriate care and attention to the Blessed Eucharist. We can only ask for forgiveness and do penance for all the sacrilegious acts and the lack of respect that are committed in front of the Blessed Eucharist. We can only ask the Lord, through the intersession of the Holy Family of Nazareth, for a greater love for their Son Incarnate, who has decided to remain here on earth with us every day until the end of time.

The gifts of the Magi, I do not have. I come forth on bended knee before the Prince of Peace, truly present in every Tabernacle in the world!!!

Holy Innocents, Martyrs December 28, 2020

During this octave of Christmas the Church celebrates the memory of the small children of the neighborhood of Bethlehem put to death by Herod. Sacrificed by a wicked monarch, these innocent lives bear witness to Christ who was persecuted from the time of His birth by a world which would not receive Him. It is Christ Himself who is at stake in this mass-murder of the children; already the choice, for or against Him, is put clearly before men. But the persecutors are powerless, for Christ came to perform a work of salvation that nothing can prevent; when He fell into the hands of His enemies at the time chosen by God it was to redeem the world by His own Blood.

The feast of the Holy Innocents is an excellent time for parents to inaugurate the custom of blessing their children. From the Ritual comes the form which we use on solemn occasions, such as First Communion. But parents can simply sign a cross on the child's forehead with the right thumb dipped in holy water and say: May God bless you, and may He be the Guardian of your heart and mind, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Our Christmas joy is tempered today by a feeling of sadness. But the Church looks principally to the glory of the children, of these innocent victims, whom she shows us in heaven following the Lamb wherever He goes.

- **St. Felix of Cantalice** was a Capuchin Friar who served God's people and led a life of devout prayer. The Felician Sisters you may be familiar with are officially known as the Congregation of Sisters of Felix of Cantalice Third Order Regular of St. Francis of Assisi (CSSF).
- **St. Ambrose** fought against Arianism after being made Bishop of Milan in 374. Ambrose had great influence with St. Augustine and became a spiritual father to him after the death of Augustine's father.
- St. Roch (Rocco) was born into a wealthy family but gave everything away after his parents' death and became a mendicant pilgrim as a Third Order Franciscan. He is the patron saint of plagues, dogs and dog lovers. He cured many of those infected with the black plague in Rome and other European cities by making the Sign of the Cross over them, a sign for us to use in prayer to protect ourselves and others during the current pandemic.
- **St. Augustine** was the son of St. Monica, a devout Christian who prayed for over 30 years for her son's conversion. Her perseverance was met with great rewards as Augustine is a Doctor of the Catholic Church and the author of *Confessions* and *The City of God.*
- **St. Bernardine** of Siena adopted a strict life of humility and poverty as a Franciscan of the Strict Observance. He continued the work of St. Vincent Ferrer, a Dominican evangelist, preaching to the lapsing Catholics in Italy. He turned down the office of bishop three times and served as Vicar General of the Franciscans for five years, reviving its practice of strict living.
