The month of September is dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrows, whose memorial the Church celebrates on September 15. September falls during the liturgical season known as Ordinary Time, which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. It is used in the offices and Masses of Ordinary Time.

# The Most Holy Name of Mary September 12, 2020

In accordance with Jewish custom our Lady's parents named her eight days after her birth, and were inspired to call her Mary. The feast of the Holy Name of Mary therefore follows that of her Birthday, as the Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus follows Christmas. The feast originated in Spain and was approved by the Holy See in 1513; Innocent XI extended its observance to the whole Church in 1683 in



thanksgiving to our Lady for the victory on September 12, 1683 by John Sobieski, king of Poland, over the Turks, who were besieging Vienna and threatening the West. It was removed from the Church calendar in the liturgical reform following **Vatican II** but restored by Pope Saint John Paul II in 2002, along with the **Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus.** 

In Hebrew, the name Mary is Miryam. In Our Lady's time, Aramaic was the spoken language, and the form of the name then in

use was *Mariam*. Derived from the root, *merur*, the name signifies "bitterness." This most holy, sweet and worthy name was 'eminently fitted to so holy, sweet and worthy a virgin. For *Mary* means a bitter sea, star of the sea, the illuminated or illuminatrix. *Mary* is interpreted *Lady*. *Mary* is a bitter sea to the demons; to men She is the Star of the sea; to the Angels She is illuminatrix, and to all creatures She is Lady.

This devotion originated in the 12th century. Thanks to the influence of **Saint Anselm** and **Saint Bernard**, it spread from monastic circles to the universal Church.

On this day dedicated to the Holy Name of Mary let us repeat that wonderful prayer of Saint Bernard, responding to Pope Benedict XVI's invitation to "invite everyone to become a trusting child before Mary, even as the Son of God did. Saint Bernard says, and we say with him: 'Look to the star of the sea, call upon Mary ... in danger, in distress, in doubt, think of Mary, call upon Mary. May her name never be far from your lips, or far from your heart ... If you follow her, you will not stray; if you pray to her, you will not despair; if you turn your thoughts to her, you will not err. If she holds you, you will not fall; if she pro-



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tects you, you need not fear; if she is your guide, you will not tire; if she is gracious to you, you will surely reach your destination" (Benedict XVI, address at Heiligenkreuz Abbey, September 9, 2007). — Luciano Alimandi

# The Exaltation of the Cross September 14, 2020



The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy
Cross, celebrated every year on September
14, recalls three historical events: the finding of the True
Cross by Saint Helena, the mother of the emperor Constantine; the dedication of churches built by Constantine on the site of the

Holy Sepulcher and Mount Calvary. The restoration of the True Cross to Jerusalem by the emperor Heraclius II. But in a deeper sense, the feast also celebrates the Holy Cross as the instrument of our salvation. This instrument of torture, designed to degrade the worst of criminals, became the life-giving tree that reversed Adam's Original Sin when he ate from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil in the Garden of Eden.

Our Mother Church sings of the triumph of the Cross, the instrument of our redemption. To follow Christ we must take up His cross, follow Him and become obedient until death, even if it means death on the cross. We identify with Christ on the Cross and become co-redeemers, sharing in His cross.

We made the Sign of the Cross before prayer which helps to fix our minds and hearts to God. After prayer we make the Sign of the Cross to keep close to God. During trials and temptations our strength and protection is the Sign of the Cross. At Baptism we are sealed with the Sign of the Cross, signifying the fullness of redemption and that we belong to Christ. Let us look to the cross frequently, and realize that when we make the Sign of the Cross we give our entire self to God — mind, soul, heart, body, will, thoughts.

## The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows September 15, 2020

The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows celebrated on September 15, 2017. Our Lady of Sorrows (Latin: Beata Maria Virgo Perdolens), the Sorrowful Mother or Mother of Sorrows (Latin: Mater Dolorosa), and Our Lady of Piety, Our Lady of the Seven Sorrows or Our Lady of the Seven Dolours are names by which the Blessed Virgin Mary is referred to in relation to sorrows in her life. As Mater Dolorosa, it is also a key subject for Marian art in the Catholic Church.

The purpose of the **Devotion of the Seven Sorrows** is to promote union with the sufferings of **Christ** through union with the special suffering that Our Lady endured because she was the **Mother of God. By uniting ourselves with both the Passion of Christ and His Holy Mother, we enter into Jesus' Heart and honor Him greatly; He is more honored because we have so honored His Mother.** 

#### From the Roman Missal:

The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows falls on September 15. This feast commemorates the sorrowful Mother and the sufferings She experienced in union with Her Son and dates back to the 12th century. Pius XII extended the feast into the Roman Catholic calendar of saints to the Latin Church (18 Sept., 1814), major double. It was as-



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signed to the third Sunday in September. It was raised to the rank of a double of the second class, 13 May, 1908. In 1913, **Pope Pius X** moved the feast to September 15, the day after the **Feast of the Cross.** It is still observed on that date.

Our Lady of Sorrows has promised us, "all those who offer up their tears of sorrow to Me, I shall repay them a thousand times over"!!!

# Feast of St. Matthew the Apostle and Evangelist September 21, 2020

At the time that Jesus summoned him to follow Him, **Matthew** was a publican, that is, a tax-collector for the Romans. His profession was hateful to the Jews because it reminded them



of their subjection; the publican, also, was regarded by the pharisees as the typical sinner. **St. Matthew** is known to us principally as an Evangelist. He was the first to put down in writing our Lord's teaching and the account of His life. His Gospel was written in Aramaic, the language that our Lord Himself spoke.

No one was more shunned by the Jews than a publican, who was a Jew working for the Roman enemy by robbing his own people and making a large personal profit. Publicans were not allowed to trade, eat, or even pray with others Jews.

One day, while seated at his table of books and money, Jesus looked at **Matthew** and said two words: "Follow me." This was all that was needed to make **Matthew** rise, leaving his pieces of silver to follow Christ. His original name, "Levi," in Hebrew signifies "Adhesion" while his new name in Christ, Matthew, means "Gift of God." The only other outstanding mention of Matthew in the Gospels is the dinner party for Christ and His companions to which he invited his fellow tax-collectors. The Jews were sur-

prised to see Jesus with a publican, but Jesus explained that he had come "not to call the just, but sinners."

**St. Matthew** is known to us principally as an Evangelist, with his Gospel being the first in the New Testament. His Gospel was written in Aramaic, the language that our Lord Himself spoke and was written to convince the Jews that their anticipated Messiah had come in the person of Jesus.

Not much else is known about **Matthew.**According to tradition, he preached in Egypt and Ethiopia and further places East. Some legends say he lived until his nineties, dying a peaceful death, others say he died a martyr's death.

In the traditional symbolization of the evangelists, based on Ezech. 1:5-10 and Rev. 4:6-7, the image of the winged man is accorded to **Matthew** because his Gospel begins with the human genealogy of Christ.

## St. Padre Pio September 23, 2020

Born to a southern Italian farm family, the son of Grazio, a shepherd. At age 15 he entered the novitiate of the Capuchin Friars in Morcone, and joined the order at age 19. He suffered several health problems, and at one point his family thought he had tuberculosis. He was ordained at age 22 on 10 August 1910.

While praying before a cross on September 20, 1918, **Padre Pio** received the stigmata. He is the first priest ever to be so blessed. As word spread, especially after American soldiers brought home stories of **Padre Pio** following WWII, the priest himself became a point of pilgrimage for both the pious and the curious.

In 1956 he founded the House for the Relief of Suffering, a hospital that serves 60,000 a year. **Padre Pio** died on September 23, 1968 at age 81.

Today there are over 400,000 members worldwide in prayer groups begun by **Padre Pio** in the 1920s.

His canonization miracle involved the cure of Matteo Pio Colella, age 7, the son of a

doctor who works in the House for Relief of Suffering, the hospital in San Giovanni Rotondo. On the night of June 20, 2000, Matteo was admitted to the intensive care unit of the hospital with meningitis. That night, during a prayer vigil attended by Matteo's mother and some Capuchin friars of Padre Pio's monastery, the child's condition improved suddenly. When he awoke from the coma, Matteo said that he had seen an elderly man with a white beard and a long, brown habit, who said to him: "Don't worry, you will soon be cured." The miracle was approved by the Congregation and Pope John Paul II on 20 December 2001.
